## Appleton native receives UW Oshkosh award

**UW Oshkosh, Oct. 05, 2015**—An Appleton native received the Jeff Curler Endowed Professor of Health Sciences award from the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh at the Opening Day Convocation Sept. 8, 2015.

Suzanne Marnocha is a professor and assistant dean in the College of Nursing and has worked in the college for 21 years.

"The award is a great personal honor and means recognition for hard work," Marnocha said, citing a variety of nursing research topics including healthcare diversity, end of life care for elders with dementia, cyber-professionalism and the use of high fidelity simulation in teaching.

Marnocha hopes to use the award to fund current and future research projects.

"My goal for research in the College of Nursing is to improve the healthcare of people and teach our nursing students to be highly ethical and professional in a technological and global culture," Marnocha said.

Marnocha earned a bachelor's and master's in nursing from the University of Evansville Indiana, and a doctorate in nursing from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee.

"I come from a long line of teachers and I love nursing so much, so what better way to ensure the future of nursing than to teach nurses," Marnocha said.

She began her career as a bedside registered nurse and continued the work even as she began teaching at UW Oshkosh, totaling to 38 years in the intensive care unit.

Marnocha's love of studying and learning stems from her belief that things change on a daily basis, which is why she said working in the UW Oshkosh College of Nursing is a perfect fit for her.

Aside from nursing, Marnocha enjoys being a wife, mother, grandmother, motorcycle rider, horse owner, chicken and honey bee raiser, gardener and sustainability enthusiast.
